The committees conduct the bulk of their business by email and formulate positions and suggest actions for consideration by the Board and by the Federation members. They also provide inputs to the Federation's legislation and budget presentations.

Tolling Roads

Reston's Terry Maynard has a worthwhile discussion of principles to be used in establishing the toll rate on roads:

1. Everyone pays tolls and they pay the same toll per mile at the same time (except discounts for congestion-alleviating HOV car and van pools and public transit).
2. All the revenue from the tolls goes to maintaining and improving the tolled road, not other transportation programs or projects or non-transportation uses.

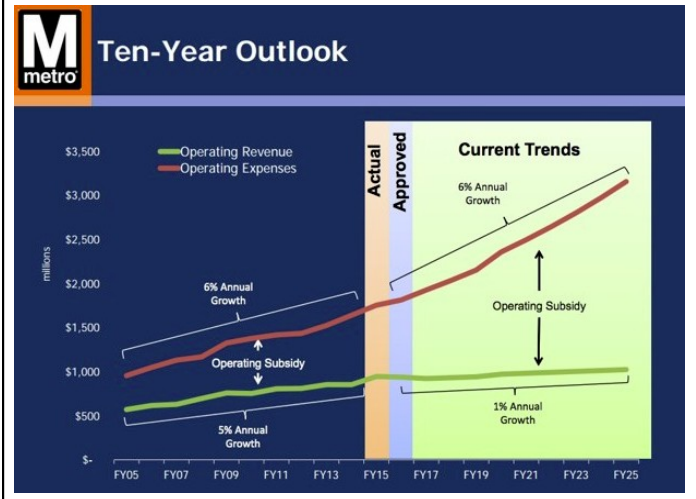

Although many economic indicators are better than last year, the average price of real-estate properties decreased 1.4% from last year. Single-family detached and attached homes decreased 2.3% and 2.9%, respectively. The decreases may mean that the tax rate must be increased to compensate.

Financing the Metro System

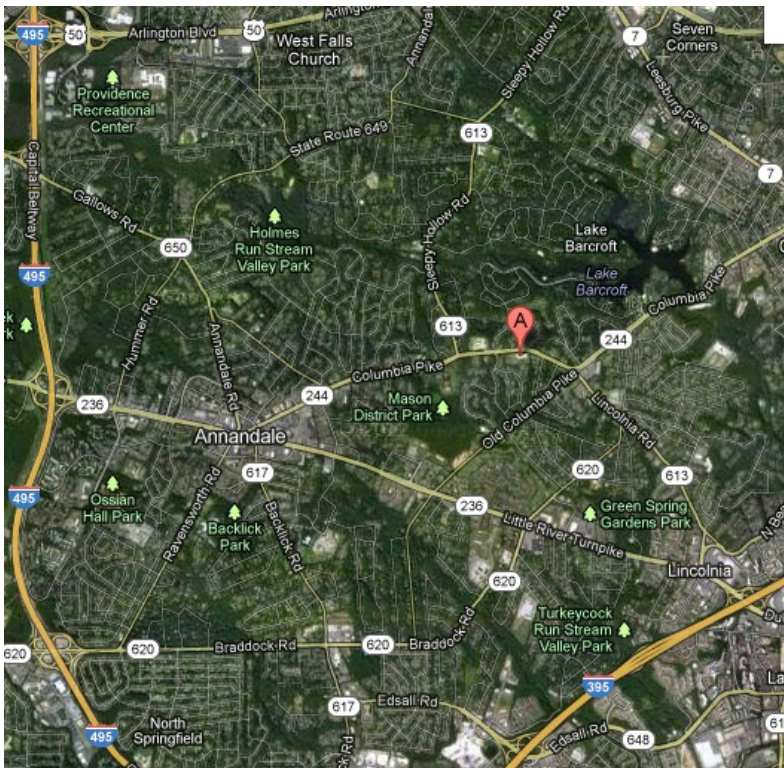
Real-estate taxes may need increasing to cover the County's increasing subsidy to the Metro system. The operating subsidy is projected by WMATA to increase greatly. See:

Library Committee Resolution

The following is a resolution passed by the membership of the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations on October 29, 2015, for sending to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors and the Library Trustees.

Preservation of Shelving Space post Renovation RESOLUTION

BACKGROUND:

During the past decade the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has been unwilling to provide an adequate materials budget to replace lost, worn out and inaccurate books for the Fairfax County Public Library.

In 2004 Tysons-Pimmit Regional Library had 175,000 books in its collection (from FCPL Materials Inventory). The Tysons-Pimmit collection has been reduced since that year by harsh discard guidelines including the following:

So-called "low demand" books are being purged with only 24 months of non-circulation (industry standard is 60 months). This particularly affects books on art, music, history, religion, philosophy and biography;

The collection was further reduced in preparation for "floating" the collection through the entire system;

Next, the collection was reduced during the attempt to transition from print to digital following the 2012 Library Strategic Plan, including the massive dumping of books during the disastrous Beta Plan;

Further loss has occurred due to the current mechanism of re-distributing books that enables Technical Operations to discard books in good condition that are transferred away from branches with too many copies or low demand copies;

Finally, on orders from Collection Services all books that are not in pristine condition must be discarded, even when wear is extremely minimal. The common and highly cost-effective procedure of mending slightly worn books is not encouraged.

As a result of all of this, Tysons-Pimmit has suffered a net loss of over 70,000 books. That's 70,000 from one Branch alone.

In 2004 Woodrow Wilson Library had a collection size of 87,000 holdings and after renovation currently holds only 46,851 books (July 2015 Collection Analysis). Another 40,000 books lost.

Under the current renovation plans for Tysons-Pimmit Regional Library, the FCPL Collection Manager has reduced the amount of shelving in floor plans so only enough linear feet of shelving for a maximum of 110,000 books will be accommodated after the renovation. The amount of linear feet for shelving space for books currently in the Tysons-Pimmit library will be halved.

Losses on this scale are occurring throughout the County. Most at risk at the moment are those Branches undergoing or soon to undergo renovation, including Tysons-Pimmit, Reston, Pohick, John Marshall and Kingstowne.

Federation's Legislative Program

Member associations of the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations met on October 29 to select eleven of eighteen Community Issues for presenting to our state legislators from Fairfax County. These Issues were compiled by nine different Federation committees who reviewed over 500 comments and opinions received during October in the Annual Federation survey of Fairfax citizens.

The voting was efficiently done in two rounds. In the first round, people voted to eliminate four Issues that they did not consider as important as the others. In the second round, another three were eliminated as being not as important as the remaining eleven.

With minor friendly edits to several of the Issues, the final selections (with their Identifier code) were:

- 16B03: Allow Fairfax County to set its own sales tax. Revise the formulas so more of the taxes collected in Northern Virginia are distributed to Northern Virginia governments.
- 16C02: Use the sales of greenhouse-gas emission credits to help communities to adapt to climate change, help consumers reduce their energy consumption, and help the coal areas of Virginia adapt to reduced coal production.
- 16C03: Require stricter regulations and increased enforcement for all counties that drain to rivers that drain to the Chesapeake Bay.
- 16E01: Increase tobacco taxes, allocating the revenue to education and health care.
- 16E02: Permit local school boards to set the opening date for school.
- 16E03: Permit counties to have the same revenue-generating authority as cities.
- 16G01: Redistrict using Iowa plan
- 16H01: Expand Medicaid in Virginia.
- 16P01: Allow public release of information related to police-involved shootings and other official police activities.
- 16T01: Make private-public transportation partnerships be competitively bid. Before adding tolls to I-66, improve adjacent roads, public transportation, tunnels and bridges.
- 16T02: Promote transportation policies, including public-transportation, pedestrian, and bicycle modes.

The following four Issues were eliminated in the first round of voting:

- 16A01: Home-owner associations need to have the capability to govern and enforce their laws.
- 16G02: Require more than 50% of the votes to be cast for the winning politician, using a run-off election if necessary.
- 16G03: Subdivide Fairfax County into multiple counties so the ratio of voters to elected officials is smaller.
- 16L01: Require more than 50% of land owners to agree to changes in the zoning of their properties.

The following three Issues were eliminated in the second round of voting:

- 16B01: Make full funding of education the highest priority.
- 16B02: Do not increase taxes, including real-estate taxes.
- 16C01: Ban or tax plastic bags.

wishes to see branch collections restored and enhanced after a decade of loss,

WHEREAS the resulting crowding of books from reduced shelving would necessitate further weeding and more discards,

WHEREAS the current collection levels throughout the county locks branch collections into the smallest collection in their history,

WHEREAS reduction in linear feet of shelf space will not allow a collection room to grow,

WHEREAS a new library director may want to eliminate the floating collection that causes books to be irregularly distributed throughout the branches,

WHEREAS Fairfax County intends for the population of Fairfax County to grow substantially by 2030,

WHEREAS the Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations desires a collection size beyond the bare minimum required by Virginia statute to provide for the growing Fairfax County population,

THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED: The Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations hereby requests that all future renovations and rebuild of county libraries have adequate linear feet of usable shelving space to house at least their historic highest collection levels.

Federation Workshop on County Urbanization

The Board of Supervisors (BOS) has underway a program to “urbanize” the county. “Urbanizing” means increasing the population density and the amount of commercial floor area. The most recent action by the Department of Planning and Zoning can be found under the heading “Planned Development Commercial (PDC), ...”, at:

Because citizens have voiced concerns about the urbanization, the Federation is organizing a workshop on the topics of revitalization and urbanization. The workshop will probably be held during the week of November 16, but possibly the week of November 9. Look for a Federation announcement distributed via email.

Revitalization will be the focus of a BOS committee in which Supervisor Cook is taking a leading role. There is little demand for the older buildings. The committee will look for new and innovative ways to repurpose the existing, obsolete properties for housing, schools, or alternative commercial uses, thereby returning the empty office buildings to productive and tax-paying use. Title 15.2 of the Code of Virginia deals with the powers of local governments. Chapters 11 and 22 are especially pertinent. Because rezoning against the will of the property owner is akin to condemnation by eminent domain, Title 25.1 is also pertinent.

Reston’s Design-Review Process

Reston has long had its own design-review system for property development or redevelopment. Plans are reviewed by the Reston Planning and Zoning Committee (P&Z), Reston Association (RA), and, in cases involving the Reston Town Center, the Reston Town Center Association (RTCA). An October 16, 2015, letter from Ellen Graves, President of the Reston Association, to Fred R. Selden, Director, Dept. of Planning & Zoning, and Barbara A. Byron, Director, Office of Community Revitalization, expressed concern that the County, in establishing its own review board for Transit-Station Area (TSA) development is usurping the Reston process. The letter has yet to be answered.

Other civic associations should follow this exchange with the county because it might set a trend in which there is a loss of the association’s design-review process.

Roessler will discuss recommendations from the “Ad Hoc Police Practices Review Commission” and his projected way ahead. The presentation will be followed by a period for Questions and Answers (Q&A).
